Mohamad Anas Haitham Soueid was sentenced to 18 months in prison for collecting recordings and other information and providing these materials to Syrian intelligence agencies. [Full Story](#)

Soloman Manasseh Mustafa was found guilty of sex trafficking, kidnapping, transporting women across state lines for prostitution, document servitude, and enticement of a minor for sexual activity. [Full Story](#)

6. Philadelphia: Ukrainian National Sentenced for Human Trafficking Operation

Stepan Botsvynyuk was sentenced to 20 years in prison for his role in a family-run operation that smuggled young Ukrainian immigrants into the United States and forced them to work for little or no pay. [Full Story](#)

7. Boston: Former Employee of Exeter Hospital Arrested in Connection with Hepatitis C Outbreak

David Matthew Kwiatkowski allegedly caused at least 30 individuals to become infected with the blood-borne virus that can cause serious damage to the liver. [Full Story](#)

8. Jacksonville: Man Pleads Guilty to Arson of Reproductive Health Facility


Bobby Joe Rogers claimed responsibility for the New Year's Day arson that destroyed the American Family Planning Clinic in Pensacola. [Full Story](#)
