

How You Can Challenge a Will after Probate

A [Grant of Probate](#) is something

that allows an individual or number of individuals the ability to deal with the recently deceased persons affairs, or 'administering the estate' as it is often called. It is of course not a nice thing to think about, but there are a number of different [reasons that a will can be challenged and contested](#). Before the will was written the testator might have been unable to make informed decisions, and have their judgement altered because of an illness or the medication that they were on, the testator may have been forced or influenced to make the will or write something into it, the will itself may have been forged, it may not have been properly executed amongst several other reasons.
