## Youths Should Think Laterally When It Comes To Job Hunting, Says Schneider Trading Associates

1.02 million youths were out of work in the last quarter, and it has been revealed to be the highest figure since records began in 1992. Many also search for a career in terms of college courses or subjects they have studied at school but this is a restrictive approach to finding a long lasting career.

Matt Silvester, head of training at STA explains: "Young people need to expand their horizons when it comes to exploring career opportunities instead of pursuing the obvious path. This is partly the result of youths not being given enough guidance to help them realise that other opportunities exist in addition to what the education system or the media talk about. A survey carried out by City & Guilds found that one in four students studying for A-level and university

qualifications had not received any careers advice, it is therefore hardly surprising that some young people struggle to understand what opportunities are available.

"The Professional Trader Programme that Schneider offers is often referred to as a graduate programme but it is not just for graduates; it is in fact open to people of all ages, backgrounds, qualifications and experience. Many young people would not necessarily know how to become a trader; the career is an avenue that youths would not consider for fear that it might be too difficult or expensive to get into.
